Quarterly Resource Scan: Quarter 4 (October 2023 – December 2023)

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Context

The Whole Child Health Alliance advances whole child health models that promote children's optimal health, development and well-being across the life course while improving health equity through delivery and payment reforms. This document highlights new literature published in the past quarter that supports the key elements of whole child health models. This resource scan includes a sampling of Q4 2023 publications from whole child health thought leaders; it is not comprehensive of all publications released in Q4 2023 that touch on whole child health.

<u>Exploring the Effects of Medicaid During Childhood on the Economy</u> <u>and the Budget: Working Paper 2023¹</u>

Summary:

This analysis explores the financial impact of Medicaid spending on children, revealing that while short-term costs are incurred upfront, long-term benefits include increased earnings in adulthood. The Congressional Budget Office suggests that these enhanced earnings could offset a significant portion of the program's initial expenses over time, contingent on various factors such as discount rates and the influence of childhood Medicaid enrollment on adult earnings. The findings underscore the complex interplay between Medicaid investment, future government revenues and fiscal considerations.

Summary:

This edition of the Kids' Share report sheds light on how public funds for children (birth through age 18) have evolved from 1960 to 2022, including responses to the COVID-19 pandemic. Authors found federal expenditures per child were approximately \$9,910 in 2022, showing a decrease from the 2021 peak. Despite early predictions of cuts, state and local spending on children increased from \$11,250 per child in 2019 to \$11,410 per child in 2020 during the pandemic.

Summary:

This presentation brief examines the outcomes for children and youth aged 19 to 23 enrolled in child-specific eligibility groups in Medicaid and the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP). Following the end of the Families First Coronavirus Response Act (FFCRA) Medicaid continuous enrollment condition, there has been a national decrease of 2.2 million in child enrollment from March to September 2023, after a notable 32% increase between February 2020 and March 2023. The analysis delves into state-specific variations and provides strategies to mitigate invalid disenrollments while optimizing outreach to families.

This report defines the opportunity gap as "the unequal and inequitable distribution of resources and experiences on the basis of race, ethnicity, socioeconomic status, English proficiency, disability, immigration status, community wealth, familial situations, geography, or other factors that contribute to or perpetuate inequities in wellbeing across groups of young children in outcomes including health, social and emotional development, and education." The report provides recommendations for policymakers, practitioners and organizations to address these gaps and ensure that all children in the United States have the chance to thrive in education, health and social-emotional development.

Summary:

This study identifies key research priorities for addressing disparities in pediatric emergency care, based on a survey of families, community partners, medical professionals, researchers, and health care-affiliated organizations. The top 12 priorities include systematic efforts to reduce disparities, collecting and reporting race, ethnicity, and language data, addressing clinician implicit bias, mental health disparities, social determinants of health, language and literacy, acute pain management disparities, equity metrics for quality of care, shared decision-making, patient experience, triage and acuity score assignment, and inclusive research participation.

Summary:

This study explores the connection between neighborhood socio-economic conditions and early child development in the United States. Findings reveal that children in neighborhoods with more equity barriers are more likely to face developmental challenges compared to those in neighborhoods with less equity barriers.²

² This study leverages the national neighborhood equity index (NNEI), which is comprised of 11 variables across the dimensions of education, economic indicators, social indicators, and wealth indicators. To conduct the analysis, the analysts established an equity barrier cutoff, and the equity barriers across each census track were summed to develop an inequity measure,

Summary:

The article discusses participants' experience in the Specialized WIC Co-Enrollment program in Denver County, which integrates the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) services into pediatric well-child and obstetric visits at Denver Health's Federally Qualified Health Centers. Between March 2021 and December 2022 1,870 families (3,347 individuals) received Specialized WIC Co-Enrollment appointments. Participants reported positive experiences, highlighting that they saved time, money, childcare, and transportation. Staff and providers emphasized the program's convenience and system-level benefits, including improved collaboration and clinic efficiency.

Abstract:

This paper draws on interviews from North Carolina Medicaid managed care organizations, North Carolina Medicaid, and actuaries with experience in value-based payment across the pediatric population to assess North Carolina's process for developing its NC Integrated Care for Kids (InCK) value-based payment model and propose strategies to support future pediatric value-based payment models. The paper highlights the need to account for payer priorities and readiness, the impact of data uncertainty on building new measures, misalignment of the short-term return-on-investment framework with whole child health measures, and state levers (e.g., mandates and incentives) to promote value-based payment.
